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## **Preface**

This manual describes how to service the L180 Tape Library and is intended primarily for StorageTek service representatives and authorized original equipment manufacturer (OEM) personnel. The service tasks that can be performed include:

- Loading microcode
- Using trouble isolation procedures (TIPs) to help diagnose problems
- Running diagnostic routines
- Replacing field replaceable units (FRUs)

**Note:** Refer to the specific tape drive publications for information about how to service the drives.

## Organization

This manual contains the following information:

Chapter 1	"Introduction" contains an introduction for servicing the L180 Tape Library and the basic components in it.
Chapter 2	"Configuration" provides information about how to update the microcode and configure the library, tape drives, network, and other values.
Chapter 3	"Trouble Isolation Procedures" provides guidelines that help you diagnose and correct operational problems. Also included in this chapter is information about how to run diagnostic tests.
Chapter 4	"Removal and Replacement" provides procedures to remove and replace the field replaceable units (FRUs) within the library.

**Appendix A** "Theory of Operation" describes the components and operation of the tape library.

**Index** Assists in locating information in this manual.

## **Safety**

The following provides information about topics that are *essential* to all service and maintenance activity:

- Your safety
- Preventing electrostatic discharge (ESD) damage to equipment

## Safety Precautions

#### **CAUTION:**

Potential injury: On-the-job safety is important; therefore, observe the following safety precautions while you are engaging in any maintenance activity. Failing to follow these precautions could result in serious injury.

Remove all conductive jewelry, such as watches and rings, before you service powered-on equipment.

- Avoid electrical shock. Be careful when you work near power connectors and supplies.
- Power-off the equipment that is being serviced before you remove a field replaceable unit (FRU) or other component. Remember that dangerous voltages could still be present in some areas even though power is off.
- Ground all test equipment and power tools.
- Lift objects properly; read the information in "Lifting Techniques" (see below).
- Do not remove, cut, or relocate any floor tiles indiscriminately. Before you manipulate floor tiles, be sure that you understand the customer's environment and receive the customer's approval. Remember, each situation is different.
- Enforce good housekeeping practices in the equipment area to help prevent fire and accidents.

**Note:** Important things to investigate and to be aware of include the use of Halon® gas, under-the-floor smoke detectors, and cables to other equipment installed nearby.

## **Lifting Techniques**

Lifting, regardless of how much or how little, can create serious back stress. If you follow these guidelines, you can reduce the risk of back injury:

- Do not twist your body to pick up something or to put it down. Twisting puts extreme pressure on your back, especially when you lift or carry objects. Instead of twisting, make the task two separate moves; first lift, and then use your feet to turn your body.
- Plan the lift: first examine the object and then determine how it will be lifted and where it will be placed.
- Choose the appropriate lifting technique. Examine the weight, size, location, frequency, and direction of the lift. Plan to avoid awkward postures, and determine if material-handling aids are needed.
- Place your feet shoulder-width apart, and place one foot a little behind the
  other. Keep your back straight because even light loads can significantly
  increase pressure on your spine when you lean forward.
- Whenever you can, grip the load with your whole hand, and use two hands.
- Carry objects at elbow height and close to your body. The farther away you hold an object, the more force it puts on your lower back.
- Lift with your legs instead of your back. Leg muscles are some of the strongest in the body. When you squat and lift with your legs, you can lift more weight safely.
- Alternate lifting tasks with tasks that are less stressful to the same muscles.
   This technique ensures that your muscles have some recovery time.

## Shoulder, Elbow, Wrist, and Hand Safety

Follow these guidelines to minimize the possibility of injury to your shoulders, elbows, wrists, and hands.

- Work within your safety zone—the area between shoulder level and knuckle level of your lowered hands. You face less chance of injury when you work or lift in this area.
- Keep your elbows bent to keep loads close to your body and to decrease
  the amount of force necessary to do the job. If you use this posture, you
  will put less weight and pressure on your shoulder.
- Be sure to keep your wrists straight. Avoid bending, extending, or twisting your wrists for long periods of time.

• Do not use a pinch grip to lift large or heavy loads because the way you lift also can affect the tendons in your hand. When you grasp an object between your thumb and fingers, you put a lot of tension on hand and wrist tendons. Use both hands—use one for a while, and then use the other—to give them rest.

## **■** Electrostatic Discharge Damage Prevention

Anyone who handles ESD-sensitive components must be aware of the damage that ESD can cause to electronic components and must take the proper precautions to prevent it. Also, anyone who performs maintenance on StorageTek equipment must complete an ESD-basics course.

#### **CAUTION:**

Potential damage to equipment: Handle ESD-sensitive components only under ESD-protected conditions. To meet this requirement, always use the Field Service Grounding Kit (PN 4711) and always follow these ESD precautions and procedures when you are servicing StorageTek equipment or handling ESD-sensitive components.

#### **ESD Precautions**

Always take the following general precautions when you work with ESD-sensitive components:

- Wear ESD protection whenever you install, remove, maintain, or repair StorageTek equipment.
- Keep ESD-sensitive printed-circuit components in their ESD-protective packages until you have taken all ESD-preventive steps and you are ready to install the component.
- Do not allow anyone to touch or handle an unprotected ESD-sensitive component unless that person has taken all ESD precautions.
- Reinstall all equipment covers and close all equipment doors after you have completed the work.
- If the grounding-kit work surface has been exposed to temperatures above 66°C (150°F) or below 4.5°C (40°F), acclimate the work surface to room temperature before you unroll it.
- Immediately place any component that you have removed into an ESD-protective package.
- Keep the grounding-kit work surface clean.

**Note:** To clean the work surface, use a mild detergent and water, and make sure that the surface is completely dry before you use it.

 Periodically check the electrical resistance of the ground cord and the wriststrap coil cord.

**Note:** The ground cord should measure less than 1.2 M $\Omega$ , and the coil cord should measure between 0.8 and 1.2 M $\Omega$ . Repair or replace the cords if they no longer meet these requirements.

#### **ESD-Protection Procedure**

Remember that each customer environment is different. Address all the customer's concerns before you work on any equipment.

#### Prepare the Work Area

- 1. Before you service the equipment, unfold the grounding-kit work surface completely and place it on a convenient surface.
- 2. Attach one end of the ground cord to the work surface; secure the snap fastener.

**Note:** You will attach the free end in a later step.

- 3. Slip on an ESD wrist strap. Make sure that the strap is comfortable and makes contact with the entire circumference of your wrist.
- 4. Snap one end of the coil cord to the wrist band.

#### **Access the Equipment**

5. Carefully open the doors to the equipment or remove the covers from the equipment. Do not touch any internal components.

#### **CAUTION:**

Be sure that you are properly grounded before you touch any internal components.

- 6. Attach the free end of the coil cord to the most appropriate place:
  - a. If you are working on components from a small piece of equipment, attach the free end of the coil cord to the grounding-kit work surface. In addition, be sure that you touch an unpainted metal surface on the equipment before you touch an internal component.
  - b. If you are working on components from a large piece of equipment, attach the free end of the coil cord to a grounding jack or to an unpainted metal surface inside the equipment.

#### **Replace Components**

- 7. Remove the defective component and place it on the work surface.
- 8. Remove the replacement component from its ESD-protective package, and install the component in the equipment.
- 9. Place the defective component in the ESD-protective package.

#### Clean Up

- 10. Disconnect the ground cords from the equipment.
- 11. Reinstall all equipment covers and close all equipment doors.
- 12. Disconnect the coil cord from your wrist, and, if necessary, disconnect the ground cord from the work surface.
- 13. Properly store the work surface and the other Field Service Grounding Kit items.

## ■ Tape Library Safety Features

Safety features are incorporated into the tape library. If the front door is opened, an electrical interlock removes power from the robot assembly.

Behind the front door, covers are placed over the MPC card, the AC power supply, and the DC power supply to prevent you from coming into contact with hazardous voltages and sensitive electronics.

#### **CAUTION:**

Confined Space: While reaching inside the library, take care to avoid bumping your head or catching your clothing on protruding edges.

## Rack Safety and Precautions

#### WARNING:

Possible personal injury:

- More than one person might be required to install equipment into the library's rack or to remove equipment from the library's rack.
- Personnel should take adequate precautions when they are moving a library that contains rack-installed equipment. The weight of some rack equipment might alter the height of the library's center of gravity. This condition might cause the library to tip during a move.

#### **CAUTION:**

Potential equipment damage: Do not exceed the maximum allowable weight (77.1 kg [170 lb]) and U-height (6U) for equipment in the rack area of this library.


Observe the following safety and handling precautions when you are installing equipment into the library's rack:


- Ensure that the equipment has UL listing (listing by Underwriters' Laboratories), CSA certification (certification by the Canadian Standards Association), and CE compliance (compliance with the European Council's directives and standards).
- Understand that the library does not supply power to the rack area. So ensure that the rack-installed equipment has an adequate power source.

**Note:** If you remove power from the library by using the library's power switch, the rack-installed equipment will remain powered-on.

- Follow the manufacturer's guidelines to position, to support, and to fasten the equipment in the rack.
- Locate the equipment so that it does not block or hinder any ventilation openings in the library's rack area. For example, do not block library or drive exhaust areas, the electronic module exhaust area, perforated metal, or other similar ventilation.
- Locate the equipment so that the library doors adequately clear the equipment when you close them.
- Install the equipment from the bottom of the rack to the top of the rack; StorageTek recommends that you place the heaviest items near the bottom of the rack.
- Ensure that the equipment in the rack does not create an overcurrent condition, whether equipment is connected directly to the branch circuit or to a power distribution strip.
- Ensure that the equipment in the rack has reliable earth ground, whether
  equipment is connected directly to the branch circuit or to a power
  distribution strip.
- Ensure that any equipment that you install within the rack is adequately cooled. The library's internal ambient temperature should not exceed the recommended operating temperature. Base cooling considerations upon the power dissipation within the rack space as well as upon the ambient room conditions that are external to the library. You must provide cooling for moderate power dissipation within the rack space.

**Note:** The following figures outline the temperature recommendations for the L180 Tape Library:





## ■ Fiber Optic Safety

#### WARNING:

Eye hazard. Never look directly into a fiber-optic cable, a fiber-optic connector, or a laser transceiver module. Hazardous conditions might exist from laser power levels that are capable of causing injury to the eye.

Be especially careful when using optical instruments with this equipment. Such instruments might increase the likelihood of eye injury.

The laser transceivers in fiber-optic equipment can pose dangers to personal safety. Ensure that anyone who works with this StorageTek equipment understands these dangers and follows safety procedures. Ensure that the optical ports of every laser transceiver module are terminated with an optical connector, a dust plug, or a cover.

Each fiber-optic interface in this StorageTek Fibre Channel equipment contains a laser transceiver that is a Class 1 Laser Product. Each laser transceiver has an output of less than 70  $\mu\text{W}$  and a wavelength of 850 nm. StorageTek's Class 1 Laser Products comply with EN60825-1(+A-11) and with sections 21 CFR 1040.10 and 1040.11 of the Food and Drug Administration (FDA) regulations.

The following translations are for users in Finland and Sweden who wish to identify laser safety and classification:

## Laser Product Label

In accordance with safety regulations, a label on each StorageTek Fibre Channel product identifies the laser class of the product and the place and date of the manufacturer. The label appears on top of a Fibre Channel tape drive and near the Fibre Channel connectors on a Fibre Channel tape library. A copy of the label is shown here:

## ■ Fiber-Optic Cable Handling

Observe these precautions when you handle fiber-optic cables:

- Do not coil the cable to less than 96 mm (3.75 in.) in diameter.
- Do not bend the cable to less than 12 mm (0.5 in.) in radius. StorageTek recommends that a cable's bend radius be no less than 20 times the diameter of the cable.
- Do not pull on the cables; carefully place them into position.
- Do not grasp the cables with pliers, grippers, or side cutters; do not attach pulling devices to the cables or connectors.
- Keep cables away from sharp edges or sharp protrusions that could cut or wear through the cable; make sure that cutouts in the equipment have protective edging.
- Protect the cable from extreme temperature conditions.

#### WARNING:

Eye hazard. Never look directly into a fiber-optic cable, a fiber-optic connector, or a laser transceiver module. Hazardous conditions might exist from laser power levels that are capable of causing injury to the eye.

Be especially careful when using optical instruments with this equipment. Such instruments might increase the likelihood of eye injury.

 Install the connector's protective cover whenever the connector is not connected.

## **■** Fiber-Optic Cable Installation

Follow these guidelines when you install fiber-optic cables:

#### 1. Cable routing:

- Raised floor: You may install fiber-optic cables under a raised floor.
   Route them away from any obstruction, such as existing cables or other equipment.
- **Cable tray or raceway:** Place the cables in position; do not pull them through the cable tray. Route the cables away from sharp corners, ceiling hangers, pipes, and construction activity.
- **Vertical rise length:** Leave the cables on the shipping spool, and lower them from above; do not pull the cables up from below. Use proper cable ties to secure the cable.
- **General:** Do not install fiber-optic cables on top of smoke detectors.

#### 2. Cable management:

- Leave at least 4.6 m (15 ft) of cable at each end for future growth.
- Use strain reliefs to prevent the weight of the cable from damaging the connector.
- Review all information in this manual and in any related manuals about safely handling fiber-optic cables.

#### **WARNING:**

Eye hazard. Never look directly into a fiber-optic cable, a fiber-optic connector, or a laser transceiver module. Hazardous conditions might exist from laser power levels that are capable of causing injury to the eye.

Be especially careful when using optical instruments with this equipment. Such instruments might increase the likelihood of eye injury.

#### 3. Connector protection:


- Insert connectors carefully to prevent damage to the connector or fiber.
- Leave the connector's protective cover in place until you are ready to make connections.
- Replace the connector's protective cover when the connector is disconnected.
- Clean the connector before making a connection. Make sure that there are no obstructions and that keyways are aligned.

This chapter contains an introduction for servicing the L180 Tape Library and the basic components in it.

## **■** Service Clearances

Figure 1-1 shows the space requirements that you need to service the library.

**Figure 1-1. Service Clearances** (C67109)



- 1. 2.6 m (8.5 ft)
- 2. 0.8 m (2.6 ft)
- 3. At all times, make sure at least 51 mm (2 in.) exists on the right and left sides of the library for airflow.

**Note:** You might want to remove the left side cover when you replace the CAP motor and the theta motor for easier access. Allow a minimum of 1 m (3.3 ft) to remove the cover.

## ■ Power System

The library power system consists of:

- One or two AC power distribution units (PDUs)
- One or two DC power supplies that provide voltage to the library
- An *optional* uninterruptible power supply (Figure 1-2 on page 1-2)

#### **AC Power Distribution Units**

Each power distribution unit (PDU):

- Operates within 100 to 127 VAC or 200 to 240 VAC at 50/60 Hz
- Distributes AC voltage to a library DC power supply
- Protects the library from overcurrent by circuit breakers

In addition, the standard PDU supplies AC voltage to the drive column. A second, optional PDU can supply power for redundancy.


## **DC Power Supplies**

If the library has two DC power supplies, one supply powers the library during normal operation. If a fault is detected, the second DC power supply assumes control, and the library posts the error to the FSC log.

## **Uninterruptible Power Supply**

The uninterruptible power supply (UPS) is an *optional* feature from APC designed to prevent blackouts, brownouts, sags and surges in AC power. This UPS is located in the rack area above the operator panel.

Figure 1-2. Uninterruptible Power Supply (C67327)




- 1. Power strip

## Power-On and Power-Off

To power-on or power-off the library:

- 1. Open the rear door by placing your fingers in the slot and pulling the door open. The door swings open to the right.
- 2. Find the power switch near the bottom of the library, shown in Figure 1-3.
- 3. Power-on the library by lifting up on the switch, or power-off the library by pressing down on the switch.

## Component Overview

The library is a fully automated cartridge storage and retrieval subsystem that consists of:

- A robot that moves cartridges among cells (Figure 1-4 on page 1-5)
- The cartridge access port (CAP) that contains two removable magazines; each magazine holds up to five cartridges (Figure 1-4 on page 1-5).


**Figure 1-6. Electronic Compartment Components** (C67105)

- Electronic module that controls the robotic operations and interfaces to the host operating systems (Figure 1-5 on page 1-6 and Figure 1-6 on page 1-7)
- Storage cells for the tape library are from 84 up to 174 cartridges, excluding the 10 CAP cells and (Figure 1-7 on page 1-8).
- Cartridges are stored in cell arrays that each hold six cartridges. The cell
  arrays are stacked in columns and the columns are arranged around the
  robot.


**Note:** The top two cells in each column are reserved and not available.

- Six reserved cells (Figure 1-8 on page 1-9)
  - Row 0, the swap cell, is reserved for in-transit cartridges.
  - Rows 1 through 5 are reserved for cleaning and/or diagnostic cartridges.

**Note:** *Never put data cartridges in reserved cells.* If the customer *wants* the Auto Clean feature enabled, at least one reserved cell must contain a cleaning cartridge.



**Figure 1-4. Major Components** (C67104)




- 1. Rear door

- 5. MPV card

Figure 1-7. Cell Locations (C67107)




- 1. 84 storage cell configuration

### **Reserved Cells**

The reserved cells are for the swap cell, diagnostic, and cleaning cartridges.

The top cell is the swap cell. It is reserved for in-transit cartridges. Do *not* insert any cartridges into this cell. This cell has two functions:

- It allows the robot to swap cartridges within the library.
- It is used in case the library loses power and the robot has a cartridge in the hand. When power is restored, the robot automatically inserts this cartridge into this cell as part of the initialization sequence.

To install diagnostic and cleaning cartridges:

- 1. Open the front door of the library.
- 2. Insert the cartridge into any of the five cells under the top cell, holding the cartridge so that the customer label is on top and the VOLSER can be read by the robot.




**Figure 1-9. Tape Drives** (C67052)

- 1. Service Required indicator is steadily red when human intervention is required.
- 2. Library Active indicator flashes green when the library is operational.
- 3. *Open* indicator is steadily amber when the CAP door is open.
- 4. CAP button opens and closes the CAP.
- 5. MENU button
- 6. Arrow down button moves the cursor down and decrements a value highlighted on the screen.
- 7. SELECT button selects an item, saves the currently highlighted value, and moves the cursor.
- 8. Arrow up button moves the cursor up and increments a value highlighted on the screen.
- 9. Graphic display screen shows current information and errors, and allows you to input from menus.
- 10. RESET button starts an initial program load (IPL).

Component Overview

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This chapter provides information about how to update the microcode and configure the library, tape drives, and network.

- **Firmware** is the instructions or data that has been written into read-only-memory (ROMs, PROMs and EPROMs).
- Microcode is the instructions that directly control a microprocessor. A single machine-language instruction typically translates into several microcode instructions.

# Updating the Microcode

Library microcode is factory-installed on all new machines and resides within a Flash PROM on the MPC card.

- For new installations, a diskette with current microcode is provided.
- For upgrades you can download microcode from the multi-platform support web site at <a href="http://mpss.stortek.com">http://mpss.stortek.com</a>.

This Web site lists the Automated Tape Solutions Library/Drive Matrix along with the product list (tape drives and libraries), current microcode level, download file, and release notes.

You must have a personal computer and the following to download the microcode to the MPC card:

- An RJ45 cable (PN 4108289xx)
- An RJ45—DB9 adapter (PN 10410823) or diagnostic cable (PN 24100134)

Starting with microcode edition 2.20, there are now two methods to download microcode to the library:

- The DOS method that requires approximately 20 minutes.
- The Hyperterminal method that requires only 6 minutes.

**Note:** The Hyperterminal method is the *preferred* method because it requires less time to download and it will be the only method available for future libraries.

### **DOS Method**

**Note:** This download method takes about 20 minutes to complete.

To download the microcode using the DOS method:

- 1. Connect the PC to the CSE port on the MPC card.
- 2. Open a DOS window on your PC.
- 3. Create a directory on the C drive (mk dir).
- 4. Insert the diskette into the personal computer.
- 5. Change to the directory on the diskette drive (cd directory name).
- 6. Copy the flash97.exe program *and* the release.prm to the directory you created on the C drive (copy flash.exe and copy release.prm c:/directory name.
- 7. From the directory on your personal computer, type in:

```
flash97 release.prm
```

#### **CAUTION:**

Equipment Damage: Do not attempt to do perform any operations on the personal computer or library until the operator panel displays DOWNLOAD COMPLETE. Damage to the MPC processor card may occur if you do not wait for the process to complete.

8. When prompted, enter the port number being used on the personal computer (generally port 1) and press <Enter> or <Return>.

After several seconds, the personal computer will display and update the number of bytes being sent. The download takes about 20 minutes.

The L180 operator panel will display DOWNLOADING.

After the personal computer displays FILE TRANSFER COMPLETED SUCCESSFULLY, the operator panel will display DOWNLOAD COMPLETE. Wait for this sequence to complete.

9. To activate the microcode, press the RESET button on the operator panel.

# **Hyperterminal Method**

It is best to read through this procedure first before attempting it since there is a *two minute time limit* after Step 7.

To use this method, the library must be fully initialized and the access door must be closed.

**Note:** This method is *only* valid with microcode version 2.20 and higher.

To download the microcode:

- Copy the release.prm to the directory you created on the C drive (copy release.prm c:/directory name)
- 2. Attach your PC to the command line interface (CLI) port.
- 3. From your PC:
  - a. For older machines, go to Start → Programs → Accessories → Hyperterminal and open a Hyperterminal session.
  - b. For WIN2000 machines, go to Start → Programs → Accessories
     → Communications → Hyperterminal and open a Hyperterminal session.
- 4. Within the File Properties, configure the connection as follows:

- 5. Click on OK.
- 6. In the Hyperterminal window, click on ENTER.

The CLI> prompt will appear.

7. Type in: download and press the [Enter] key.

A message will appear stating that you have *two minutes* to begin sending the new microcode version.

8. At the top of the window, find the TRANSFER button and point to SEND FILE.

A box will appear, allowing you to browse to the file location of the microcode you copied in step 1.

9. Double click on release.prm.

The SEND FILE box will appear, showing the pathname and the protocol chosen. Protocol should be set to Z-MODEM.

#### 10. Click on SEND.

The status window for the transfer will appear.

11. Wait for the following prompt: Reboot 'yes'?

Respond with 'yes' to reboot the machine and activate the microcode. (Or you may power cycle or IPL the library to activate the microcode.)

If you do not reboot, power cycle, or IPL the library to activate the new microcode, the old version will remain active. When the next reboot, power cycle, or IPL occurs, the new microcode will become active.

When the reboot is complete, verify that the version is correctly listed on the operator panel.

# Configuration Overview

Configuration data consists of client connection, library capacity, panel types, along with the number and types of tape drives. The library and its associated drives must be configured:

- During installation
- When the MPC card is replaced
- When a drive is added to or removed from the library

Before starting the configuration procedure:


- 1. Read the information in this chapter.
- 2. Determine your choices and write your configuration information into Table 2-2 and Table 2-3 on page 2-7.
- 3. Make a copy of this information and keep it for future reference.

### **Initial Status**

The first screen to appear on the operator panel after an IPL is the initial status screen. This is an information only screen and displays information.

Figure 2-1 is an example of the initial status screen:

# **Library Information**

The Library Configuration Menu lets you modify the library's configuration. From this menu, you may access editing menus for setting the library's interface identifier, Fast Load status, date and time.

Figure 2-4 shows an example of the library configuration screen.

**Note:** The sequence of this configuration assumes that you will make all entries at one time. Each item is saved as it is changed, except for the library's SCSI ID or Fibre Channel Port 0 address.

To save a revised library SCSI ID or Fibre Channel address, you must reset the library by pressing the RESET button.

# **Setting the Library SCSI ID**

The Lib SCSI I/F Config Menu lets you view the library's SCSI type (differential or single-ended) and access an edit menu for the library's SCSI ID.

Figure 2-5 shows an example of the library SCSI interface screen.

If the control path for the library is SCSI, you must set a SCSI ID for the library at the operator panel.

**Note:** When configuring the library to a UNIX workstation, it is recommended that you use a dedicated SCSI client bus adapter:

- For wide SCSI adapters, you may assign any target from 0–14.
- For narrow SCSI adapters, you may assign any target from 0–6.

If you choose to use the embedded system bus on the SPARC station, available targets are 6, 5, 2, or 0, because the remaining targets are reserved for Sun peripherals.

For IBM RISC System/6000 machines, available targets on the embedded system bus are 6, 5, 3, or 2.

- 1. From the online status screen, press the MENU button. The Main Menu will display.
- 2. Press the down arrow button until the cursor underscores CONFIGURATION.
- 3. Press the **SELECT** button. The Main Configuration Menu will appear. The cursor will line up with LIBRARY CONFIG.
- 4. Press the **SELECT** button. The Lib Config Menu will appear. The cursor will line up with LIB SCSI I/F CONFIG.
- 5. Press the **SELECT** button. The Lib SCSI I/F Config Menu will appear. (This menu also displays the type of SCSI interface: differential or single-ended.)
- 6. Press the arrow buttons until the cursor underscores SCSI ID.
- 7. Press the **SELECT** button. The Set Lib SCSI ID Menu will appear.
- 8. Use the up and down arrow buttons to change the ID.
- 9. When the ID is correct, press the **SELECT** button to save the changes. Press the **MENU** button to abort.
  - If the library SCSI ID is the only configuration value you wish to set at this time, press the RESET button.
  - If you wish to set other configuration values before you reset the library, continue with the next section.

### **Setting the Library Fibre Channel Port 0 Address**

If the control path for the library is Fibre Channel, you must set the Library's Fibre Channel Port 0 address.

The Lib Fibre I/F Config Menu lets you view the library's worldwide ID and Port 0 Worldwide ID. This menu also lets you access an edit menu for the library's Port 0 address.

Figure 2-6 shows an example of the library Fibre Channel interface screen.

To set this value:

- 1. From the online status screen, press the MENU button. The Main Menu will display.
- 2. Press the down arrow button until the cursor underscores CONFIGURATION.
- 3. Press the **SELECT** button. The Main Configuration Menu will appear. The cursor will line up with LIBRARY CONFIG.
- 4. Press the **SELECT** button. The Lib Config Menu will appear. The cursor will line up with LIB FIBRE I/F CONFIG.
- 5. Press the **SELECT** button. The Lib Fibre I/F Config Menu will appear. (This menu also displays the library's worldwide ID (the node ID) and the Port 0 worldwide ID (the port ID). These two IDs are set at the factory and cannot be changed. Each ID is 64 bits and uses the IEEE registered format.) The cursor will line up with PORT 0 CONFIGURATION.
- 6. Press the **SELECT** button. The Fibre Port 0 Configuration menu will appear.

**Note:** Consult the system administrator before selecting the library's Port 0 addressing option.

If you want to have your network's software set the library Port 0 address, you must set the hard address option to DISABLED by:

- a. Pressing the arrow buttons until the cursor underscores AUTO ADDRESS.
- b. Pressing the **SELECT** button. The Port Hard Address Edit Menu will appear.
- c. Using the up and down arrow buttons to select DISABLED.
- d. Pressing the SELECT button to save the selected option.

**Note:** The default for the hard address option is DISABLED.

- 7. If you want to set the library Port 0 address, you must set the HARD ADDRESS option to ENABLED (see Step 7) and enter a port address by:
  - e. Selecting ADDRESS from the Fibre Port 0 Configuration menu. The Port Address menu will appear.
  - f. Using the up and down arrow buttons to select a digit for each field in the three-field address. Permissible addresses are 001 through 125.
  - g. Pressing the SELECT button to save the address.
- If the library Fibre Channel Port 0 address is the only configuration value you wish to set at this time, press the RESET button.
- If you wish to set other configuration values before you reset the library, continue with the next section.

# **Enabling/Disabling Fast Load**

The Fast Load feature adjusts the robot's timing during cartridge load operations:

- With the Fast Load feature *enabled*, the robot will mount a cartridge into a drive and then immediately perform its next task, not waiting for the drive to complete its loading cycle.
- With the Fast Load feature *disabled*, the robot will wait at the drive location until the tape is fully loaded before beginning its next task.

**Note:** Some client software does not support the Fast Load feature. Consult the systems administrator before enabling this feature.

- 1. At the Lib Config Menu, press the arrow button until the cursor underscores FAST LOAD.
- 2. Press the **SELECT** button. An editing screen appears.
- 3. Use the up and down arrow buttons to select either ON or OFF.

- 4. When the screen displays your desired setting, press the SELECT button to save the changes. Press the MENU button to abort.
  - If you have already changed the library's SCSI ID or Port 0 address and are planning to exit the Main Configuration Menu at this time, you must press the RESET button.
  - If you wish to set other configuration values, continue with the next section.
  - If you have not changed the library's SCSI ID or Port 0 address and are not setting other configuration values, press the MENU button until you exit all menus.

## **Setting the Date**

The library saves the current date in non-volatile memory.

- 1. At the Lib Config Menu, press an arrow button until the cursor underscores DATE.
- 2. Press the **SELECT** button. An editing screen appears.
- 3. On the editing screen:
  - a. Use the up and down arrow buttons to select a value for each portion (field) of the date.
  - b. Use the **SELECT** button to move right to the next field.
  - c. Use the MENU button to move left to the previous field.
- 4. When the screen displays your desired setting, press the SELECT button from the right-most field to save the changes. Press the MENU button to abort.
  - If you have already changed the library's SCSI ID or Port 0 address and are planning to exit the Main Configuration Menu at this time, you must press the RESET button.
  - If you wish to set other configuration values, continue with the next section.
  - If you have not changed the library's SCSI ID or Port 0 address and are not setting other configuration values, press the MENU button until you exit all menus.

### **Setting the Time**

The library saves the current time in non-volatile memory.

- 1. Press the arrow button until the cursor underscores TIME.
- 2. Press the **SELECT** button. An editing screen appears.
  - a. Use the up and down arrows to select a value for each field of the time.
  - b. Use the **SELECT** button to move right to the next field.
  - c. Use the MENU button to move left to the previous field.
- 3. When the screen displays your desired setting, press the SELECT button from the right-most field to save the changes. Press the MENU button to abort.
  - If you have already changed the library's SCSI ID or Port 0 address and are planning to exit the Main Configuration Menu at this time, you must press the RESET button.
  - If you wish to set other configuration values, continue with the next section.
  - If you have not changed the library's SCSI ID or Port 0 address and are not setting other configuration values, press the MENU button until you exit all menus.

# **Drive Configuration**

The Drive Configuration Menu lets you modify portions of each drive's configuration. For each drive, the menu displays the drive position, drive type, and, if the drive path is SCSI, the drive's SCSI ID and the drive's SCSI bus relationship with the library. If the drive path is Fibre Channel, the menu displays FIBRE I/F after the drive type.

Sub-menus let you change the SCSI ID and indicate whether the drive is on the same SCSI bus as the library or off the SCSI bus.

**Notes:** These statements apply to this menu:

- 1. The cursor position is saved on all screens that list the library's drives.
- 2. The panel displays 16 lines of data per menu. If you library contains more than seven drives, you must use the down arrow button to scroll to drives 08 and 09.

Figure 2-7 shows an example of the drive configuration screen.

### **Drive Entries ~ SCSI Drives Only**

These notes apply to configuring a 9840 or T9840 Tape Drive:

- To configure a 9840 or T9840 Tape Drive's SCSI ID and bus status from the library's operator panel, the drive must have version 1.24 or later. Check the drive's version, from the Main Menu.
- Configuring a 9840 or T9840 Tape Drive might involve more than setting the drive's SCSI ID and bus status. Refer to the 9840/T9840/T9940 Tape Drive Service Reference Manual for more information about the tape drive configuration options and instructions.

Two entries at the library operator panel complete the configuration choices for each SCSI drive installed in the library:

- SCSI ID
- Bus status (on or off bus)

**Note:** "On bus" means that the drive is on the same SCSI bus as the library. "Off bus" means that the drive is *not* on the same SCSI bus

You set the drive SCSI IDs and bus status choices from the drive configuration menu. You can enter both values for each drive at the same time.

To set this value:

- 1. Press an arrow button until the cursor underscores DRIVE CONFIG.
- 2. Press the **SELECT** button. The screen will list all installed drives, and the cursor will align with the first drive on the list.

The format of the drive information appears in the following example:

```
00 DLT8000 ID:___
ON BUS: ON
```

The first two digits are the drive's logical number, that is, the number that the library has assigned the drive. The library sets this number during its automatic configuration sequence (at power-on or reset). It is an internal number *only* and is shown for information only. The uppermost drive within the column is designated as "0," the next is "1," and so forth

Next in the example is the drive type (DLT 8000 in this example). To the right of the drive type is the SCSI ID. On the next line is the drive's bus status.

### **Drive Entries ~ LTO Drives**

LTO drives display as:

- IBM LTO for the IBM Ultrium drives
- SGT LTO for the Seagate Ultrium drives
- HP LTO for the Hewlett-Packard Ultrium drives

These statements explain how drive information might appear on the menu:

- If the drive is a Fibre Channel drive, the menu will display FIBRE I/F instead of the SCSI ID.
- If the menu displays INVALID instead of the SCSI ID for a drive, you
  must set the drive's SCSI ID to a valid address.

#### To set this value:

1. Use the arrow buttons to scroll to the drive you wish to change and press the SELECT button. The Set Drive SCSI ID Menu will appear.

**Note:** The operator panel displays only 16 lines per menu. If the library contains more than seven drives, you must use the down arrow button to scroll to drives 08 and 09.

- 2. Use the up and down arrow buttons to change the ID.
- 3. When the ID is correct, press **SELECT** to save your changes. A message screen will appear to indicate that the library is saving the new ID. Then the drive configuration menu will re-appear.

These statements explain how the drive configuration might look after it reappears:

- The cursor position is the same as it was in Step 3.
- The new SCSI ID for the tape drive might not appear right away.
- 4. Press the arrow down button to get to the drive's second line of information (which is the drive's bus status field).
- 5. Press the **SELECT** button. The Set Drive SCSI Bus Menu will appear.
- 6. Use the up and down arrow buttons to change the bus status to ON or OFF.
- 7. When your choice is highlighted, press the SELECT button to save the changes. Press the MENU button to abort, the drive configuration screen will reappear.
- 8. Continue these steps until all drives are configured.

### **Drive Entries (LTO Fibre Channel Only)**

You may either set a hard Fibre Channel address of 0 for LTO drives or allow the address to be set automatically, through arbitration.

**Note:** Before you enter an LTO Fibre Channel address to 0, you must first set the drive's Fibre Channel hard address option to *enabled*.

If you configure the drive for soft addressing, you allow the network to configure the address. To do this, you must set the Fibre Channel hard address option to *disabled*. The default for this option is *disabled*.

#### To set this value:

- 1. Press the arrow buttons to scroll to the drive you wish to configure and press the SELECT button. The screen will allow you to select hard addressing to enabled or disabled.
- 2. Press the up and down arrow buttons to line up with your choice. Press **SELECT** and:
  - If you select enabled, the hard address will be set to 0
  - If you select disabled, the address will arbitrate through the channel.
- 3. Press the **SELECT** button to save the changes. Press the **MENU** button to abort.
- 4. If you wish to set other configuration values, continue with the next section.
  - If you have already changed the library's SCSI ID or Port 0 address and are planning to exit the Main Configuration Menu at this time, you must press the RESET button.
  - If you wish to set other configuration values, continue with the next section.
  - If you have not changed the library's SCSI ID or Port 0 address and are not setting other configuration values, press the MENU button until you exit all menus.

### Drive Entries ~ 9840/T9840B

To configure a 9840/T9840B drive:

- 1. The drive must have firmware version 1.24 or higher. Check the drive's firmware version, by selecting DRIVE INFO from the Main Menu.
- 2. Configuring a 9840/T9840B/T9940 drive might involve more than setting the drive's SCSI ID and bus status.

Refer to the *9840/T9840B/T9940 Tape Drive Service Reference Manual* for information about *9840/T9840B/T9940* drive configuration options and instructions.

# **Network Configuration**

The Network Config Menu lets you modify the library's network configuration and view the library's Ethernet address.

Figure 2-8 shows an example of the network configuration screen.

Four entries complete the library's network configuration:

- Library name
- IP address
- Network gateway
- Subnet mask

You also can view the library's Ethernet address.

**Note:** You might need to consult the systems administrator for some information.

# **Viewing the Ethernet Address**

**Note:** The library's Ethernet address is pre-set at the factory. You cannot change it.

To view the Ethernet address:

- 1. At the Main Configuration Menu, press the arrow down button to line up the cursor with NETWORK CONFIG.
- 2. Press the **SELECT** button. The Network Config Menu will appear.
- 3. The library's Ethernet address appears at the bottom of the screen.

### **Setting the Library Name**

The system administrator might assign the library a name. The name is mapped to the IP address but does not affect operation.

To set this value:

- 1. At the Network Config Menu, press an arrow button until the cursor underscores LIBRARY NAME.
- 2. Press the **SELECT** button. An editing screen appears.
- 3. On the editing screen:
  - a. Use the up and down arrow buttons to select a value for each character (field) in the name.
  - b. Use the **SELECT** button to move right to the next field.
  - c. Use the MENU button to move left to the previous field.

**Note:** Do not enter a library name longer than 30 characters.

4. When the screen displays your desired setting, press the **SELECT** button twice to save the changes. Press the **MENU** button to abort.

## **Setting the IP Address**

The system administrator might assign the library an IP address, which makes the library accessible through a network.

**Note:** To use the Horizon L Series Library Monitor, you must set the library's IP address at the operator panel.

To set the IP address:

- 1. At the Network Config Menu, press an arrow button until the cursor underscores IP ADDRESS.
- 2. Press the **SELECT** button. An editing screen appears.
- 3. On the editing screen:
  - a. Use the up and down arrow buttons to select a value for each digit (field) in the address.
  - b. Use the **SELECT** button to move right to the next field.
  - c. Use the MENU button to move left to the previous field.
- 4. When the screen displays your desired setting, press the SELECT button from the right-most field to save the changes. Press the MENU button to abort.

### **Setting the Network Gateway Address**

**Note:** Entering this address is optional. It serves to indicate the gateway connection between subnets, but it is applicable only when such a connection exists and is necessary to library operation.

Consult the systems administrator for additional information.

To set the network gateway address:

- 1. At the Network Config Menu, press an arrow button until the cursor underscores NETWORK GATEWAY.
- 2. Press the SELECT button. An editing screen appears.
- 3. On the editing screen:
  - a. Use the up and down arrow buttons to select a value for each digit (field) in the address.
  - b. Use the **SELECT** button to move right to the next field.
  - c. Use the MENU button to move left to the previous field.
- When the screen displays your desired setting, press the SELECT button from the right-most field to save the changes. Press the MENU button to abort.

### **Setting the Subnet Mask Address**

The system administrator might assign the library a subnet mask address if one is required. This address makes the library accessible through a subnet on a large network.

To set the subnet mask address:

- 1. At the Network Config Menu, press an arrow button until the cursor underscores SUBNET MASK.
- 2. Press the **SELECT** button. An editing screen appears.
- 3. On the editing screen:
  - a. Use the up and down arrow buttons to select a value for each digit (field) in the address.
  - b. Use the **SELECT** button to move right to the next field.
  - c. Use the MENU button to move left to the previous field.
- 4. When the screen displays your desired setting, press the SELECT button from the right-most field to save the changes. Press the MENU button to abort.

- If you have already changed the library's SCSI ID or Port 0 address and are planning to exit the Main Configuration Menu at this time, you must press the RESET button.
- If you wish to set other configuration values, continue with the next section.
- If you have not changed the library's SCSI ID or Port 0 address and are not setting other configuration values, press the MENU button until you exit all menus.

# **Installing a Personality Module**

If you are planning to use the Horizon L Series Library Monitor, install its personality module and other components according to the documentation included in the monitor shipping package. Consult this documentation for instructions about how to set required configuration data.

# **Setting the Web Password**

If your library has StorageTek's L-Series Library Administrator installed, you must set a web password at the operator panel. For instructions on how to set this value, see the documentation that shipped with the software.

If you need to reset the password:

- 1. Connect to the command line interface (CLI)
- 2. Enter password reset
- 3. Enter \*1\* to reset the password to horizon

### **Screen Characteristics**

You also can change the operator panel's screen characteristics from the main configuration menu. The screen characteristics are saved in non-volatile memory.

To change the contrast and backlight (or brightness) of the operator panel screens:

- 1. At the Main Configuration Menu, press an arrow button until the cursor underscores DISPLAY INFO.
- 2. Press the **SELECT** button. The Display Info Menu will appear.
- 3. Use the arrow buttons to line up with the desired screen characteristic: CONTRAST or BACKLIGHT. An editing screen will appear.
- 4. On the editing screen, use the up and down arrow buttons to change the count value.

**Note:** To reset the screen characteristics to the default values, line up the cursor with RESTORE DEFAULTS and press the SELECT button.

5. When the value is correct, press the **SELECT** button to save the changes. Press the **MENU** button to abort.

# **Cleaning Cartridge Warning Count**

The Cleaning Info Menu provides information about the library's cleaning cartridges, lets you change the warning count for each type of cleaning cartridge, as well as import and export cleaning cartridges from the library.

This menu also lets you check the number of times a cleaning cartridge has been used.

Figure 2-9 shows an example of the cleaning information screen.

Cleaning cartridges have a limited life span. After multiple uses, a cleaning cartridge must be replaced and disposed of.

If you have enabled the Auto Clean feature, you can use the operator panel to set the maximum number of times a cleaning cartridge can be used (or the "warning count").

- For DLT drives, the product manual specifies that you can use a DLT cleaning cartridge a maximum of 20 times.
- For 9840 cartridges, refer to the 9840/T9840 Tape Drive User's Reference Manual.
- For Ultrium cartridges, refer to the specific manufacturer's documentation.

**Note:** The Auto Clean feature is automatically enabled if you insert even one cleaning cartridge into the reserved cell area and then reset the library.

You set the cleaning cartridge warning count from the Cleaning Info menu.

To set this value:

- 1. From the status screen, press the MENU button. The Main Menu will appear.
- 2. Press the arrow button until the cursor underscores CLEANING INFO.
- 3. Press the **SELECT** button. The Cleaning Info menu will appear. This menu displays the number of cleaning cartridges in the reserved area.
- 4. Using an arrow button, line up the cursor with the appropriate drive's WARNING COUNT.
- 5. Press the SELECT button for your choice. An editing screen will appear.
- 6. The editing screen displays the current setting for the cartridge warning count. It displays the maximum recommended warning count below the current setting. On this screen, use the up and down arrow buttons to change the count value.
- 7. When the value is correct, press the **SELECT** button to save the changes. Press the **MENU** button to abort.
- 8. When you are finished, press the MENU button twice to return to the library status screen.

# **L-Series Library Admin Entries**

The L-Series Library Admin is an optional Web-based interface to the library. Before you can use the interface to monitor the library or alter the library's configuration, you must enter two values at the operator panel:

- The library's IP address
- The library's Web password

For instructions on how to make these entries, see the documentation included in the monitor shipping package. For instructions on using the interface to alter the library's configuration or monitor library activity, access the online help files for the monitor.

# **Configuration Verification**

When you have completed all configuration entries, the operator panel will notify you if you made a change that requires you to press the RESET button.

When the library becomes ready, go through the configuration screens to verify that all information is complete.

Configuration Overview

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This chapter provides information about trouble isolation procedures (TIPs). TIPs are guidelines that help you diagnose and correct operational problems that do not result in the library displaying a fault symptom code (FSC).

### TIP 1010: UPS Power Problems

Use this TIP to troubleshoot power problems with the uninterruptible power supply (UPS). This UPS is an optional feature that was designed to help prevent blackouts, brownouts, sags and surges in AC power to the library.

See "Uninterruptible Power Supply" on page A-6 for a wiring diagram and more information about the UPS.

#### **Notes:**

If power fails, the UPS will supply power to the equipment connected to the power strip until the batteries are exhausted. While running on battery power, periodic beeps will sound.

- Press the TEST/ALARM DISABLE button to turn off this alarm.
- A continuous beep will sound *two* minutes before the UPS will shutdown.

#### 10. Drive Replacement:

#### **CAUTION:**

System interruption: To avoid a system interruption, be sure to carefully follow the steps below when replacing the drive.

- a. Place the drive in a convenient position near the defective drive's position.
- b. Have the operator quiesce the system's SCSI bus or Fibre Channel connection.
- c. Replace the drive:
  - 1. For DLT drives, follow the procedure in "DLT Tape Drive" on page 4-99 to replace the drive.
  - 2. For IBM Ultrium drives, follow the procedure in "IBM Ultrium Tape Drive" on page 4-117.
  - 3. For HP Ultrium drives, follow the procedure in "HP Ultrium Tape Drive" on page 4-124.
  - 4. For Seagate Ultrium drives, follow the procedure in "Seagate Ultrium Tape Drive" on page 4-130.

#### **CAUTION:**

Special information for 9840 drives: Consult the 9840/T9840/T9940 Tape Drive Service Reference Manual for drive configuration options. The library will automatically assign the same address to the replacement drive. However, you may need to configure other information for the drive before performing the swap.

5. For 9840 drives, follow the directions in the 9840/T9840/T9940 Tape Drive Service Reference Manual above to replace the drive.

#### 11. Recovery Information:

Drive, library, and system recovery from the hot swap procedure is explained below.

Once the drive is replaced:

- A SCSI Bus Reset command is *not* asserted during the operation.
- The library will sense that a new drive is installed.
- Library communications with the drive are automatically resumed.
- The SCSI ID of the drive is automatically assigned the same ID of the drive that was replaced—no reconfiguration or library re-boot is required.
- The drive type, serial number, and microcode version is also automatically updated.
- The drive handle is cycled (DLT only).
- The drive is automatically available to the library.
- Some system intervention may still be required to make the drive available to the system.

## **Drive Status Messages**

Table 3-2 summarizes drive status messages that might appear on the initial status screen:

**Table 3-2. Drive Status Messages** 

Status Message	Explanation
INIT REQUIRED	You must initialize this drive.
NOT CONNECTED	This drive is not connected to the library.
UNKNOWN DRIVE	The library does not recognize the type of drive in this location.
NOT COMMUNICATE	This drive is not communicating with the library. (This drive might be powered off.)
NOT FUNCTIONAL	This drive is not operating properly.
EMPTY	No cartridge is loaded in this drive.
CARTRIDGE IN	This drive contains a cartridge, but it is not loaded into the drive.
CLEAN NEEDED	This drive requires cleaning. This message appears only if the drive is empty.
CLEAN FAILED	The attempt to clean this drive failed. This message appears only if the drive is empty.
LOADING	The drive is loading a cartridge.
REWOUND	The cartridge in this drive has been rewound.
UNLOADING	The drive is unloading a cartridge.
LOADED	A cartridge is loaded in this drive.
REWINDING	The cartridge in this drive is being rewound.
BUSY	This drive is performing a read or write operation.
CLEANING	The drive is being cleaned.

These messages might also appear on the Drive Information Menu and the Drive Diagnostics menu.

## Diagnostic Tests

Diagnostic tests simulate online library operation. These tests must be run only when the target mechanisms are *offline*.

For example, if the test exercises only the robot and does not affect any drives (as in the Get-Put diagnostic test), only the library must be offline. If, however, you want to mount a cartridge to a drive (Mount-Dismount diagnostic test), both the library *and* drive must be offline.

The Get-Put Loop and Mount-Dismount diagnostic tests are used to check library and drive operation.

## **Diagnostics Menu**

The Main Diagnostics Menu lets you perform these functions:

#### Drive-related functions:

- Clean Drive: Enables you to clean tape drives manually
- Mount: Inserts a test cartridge into a drive
- Dismount: Removes a test cartridge from a drive
- Run Drive Check: Determines if the DLT 8000, 9840, or T9840 Tape drive is functioning
- Mount-Dismount Loop: Inserts a test cartridge into and removes it from a drive. (You may designate the number of times the library goes through the loop.)
- **Get-Put Loop:** Gets a test cartridge and puts it in another location. (You may designate the number of times the library goes through the loop.)
- **Demo Mode:** Simulates library operation

## **Get-Put Loop Diagnostic Test**

The Get-Put Loop diagnostic test verifies that the robot can move from cell-tocell, using a diagnostic cartridge. The robot:

- Retrieves (gets) the diagnostic cartridge from the reserved cell
- Moves the hand and cartridge laterally and vertically
- Inserts (puts) the cartridge back into the reserved cell

To run the Get-Put Loop diagnostic test:

- 1. Make sure the library is offline.
- 2. Make sure the front door is closed and the library menu is displayed.
- 3. Make sure a diagnostic cartridge is in the reserved area.
- 4. From the status screen, press the MENU button.
- 5. Use the down arrow button to move the cursor next to DIAGNOSTICS.
- 6. Press the **SELECT** button. The diagnostics screen appears.
- 7. Use the down arrow button to move the cursor next to GET-PUT Loop.
- 8. Press the SELECT button. The get-put loop screen appears.
- 9. Follow the screen directions to set the number of times you want the test to run.
- 10. Press the **SELECT** button.
- 11. You will be prompted to confirm that you want the library in Maintenance Mode (offline) before beginning the test (ARE YOU SURE?). Press the SELECT button.
- 12. When this diagnostic test has completed, press the MENU button to return to the DIAGNOSTICS menu.

## **Mount-Dismount Loop Diagnostic Test**

The Mount-Dismount Loop diagnostic test verifies that the robot can mount and dismount a cartridge to a drive. The robot:

- Retrieves a diagnostic cartridge
- Mounts the cartridge into a drive

When the drive unloads the cartridge, the robot:

- Retrieves the cartridge
- Inserts it back into its reserved cell.

To run the Mount-Dismount diagnostic test:

- 1. Make sure both the library and target drive are offline.
- 2. Make sure the front door is closed and the library menu is displayed.
- 3. Make sure a diagnostic cartridge is in the reserved area.
- 4. From the status screen, press the MENU button. The main menu appears.
- 5. Use the down arrow button to move the cursor next to DIAGNOSTICS.
- 6. Press the **SELECT** button. The diagnostics screen appears.
- 7. Use the down arrow button to move the cursor next to DRIVE DIAGNOSTICS.
- 8. Press the **SELECT** button. The list of available drives appears.
- 9. Use the arrow button to move the cursor to the drive you want to mount.
- 10. Press the **SELECT** button. The list of drive diagnostic tests appears.
- 11. Use the arrow button to move the cursor to MOUNT/DISMOUNT LOOP.
- 12. Press the **SELECT** button.
- 13. You will be prompted to confirm that you want the library in Maintenance Mode (offline) before beginning the test (ARE YOU SURE?). Press the SELECT button.
- 14. When this diagnostic test has completed, press the MENU button to return to the DIAGNOSTICS menu.

## **Other Diagnostic Tests**

You might want to run all diagnostic tests. Descriptions of other tests that are available are listed below.

Clean Drive This routine will mount and dismount a specified cleaning

cartridge to a drive. This routine does *not* require the library to be offline. *Make sure you show the operator how to run this test*. Refer to the *L180 Tape Library Operator's Guide*, PN 95895.

**Mount** This test will mount a diagnostic cartridge to a selected drive.

**Dismount** This test will dismount a diagnostic cartridge from a selected

support this test are the DLT 8000 and the 9840.

(The 9840 must be running code version 1.28 or later.)

Figure 4-5. Hand-camera Assembly (C67136)



**Figure 4-6. Fan Tray Assembly** (C67142)






**Figure 4-9. MPW Card** (C67296)

**Figure 4-11. Theta Motor** (C67164)





**Figure 4-13. Z Flex Cable** (C67212)





Figure 4-14. Library SCSI Y Cable (C67217)





Figure 4-15. Drive SCSI Y Cable (C67222)





Figure 4-17. DLT Power Supply (C67187)







# **Theory of Operation**




This appendix provides information about the components and operation of the L180 Tape Library.

**Note:** Refer to your drive publications for information about the tape drives.

## **Power System**

The tape library contains one standard AC power distribution unit (PDU) and one standard DC power supply.

#### **Notes:**

- The customer can order an optional AC PDU and an optional DC power supply for redundancy.
- The customer can also order an uninterruptible power supply as an optional feature for the library. See "Uninterruptible Power Supply" on page A-6 for more information.

The standard AC PDU, behind the rear door, distributes AC line voltage to the tape library and the tape drive column.

If the standard PDU fails and no optional PDU is installed, the library and all drives lose power. The MPC card posts an error to the FSC log.

If either PDU fails in a dual PDU configuration, and each PDU is cabled to half of the installed drives, the operating PDU supplies power to its half of the installed drives and to the library. The MPC card posts an error to the FSC log.

The MPC card contains a +5 V sense circuit that monitors the +5 VDC on the MPC card. If +5 VDC is out of established ranges, the MPC card sends a shut down request to the MPF card, and DC power is shut down. If an optional DC supply is present, it will automatically assume control of tape library power.

You may install the maximum number of drives in the library if the power source at the site is 120 to 127 VAC:

- 10 DLT drives (with or without Power Factor Correction [PFC])
- 10 LTO Ultrium drives
- Six 9840/T9840s and one DLT or one Ultrium drive

You may do so even if the library is connected to a single AC circuit.

#### At 200 to 240 VAC

## **Uninterruptible Power Supply**


The uninterruptible power supply (UPS) is an optional feature designed to prevent blackouts, brownouts, sags and surges in AC power. This UPS also filters out small fluctuations and disturbances in AC line voltage.

The UPS comes with a power strip that allows you to connect up to eight additional components to the UPS. If power fails, the UPS will supply power to the equipment connected to the power strip until the batteries are exhausted. While running on battery power, periodic beeps will sound.

- Press the TEST/ALARM DISABLE button to turn off this alarm.
- A continuous beep will sound two minutes before the UPS will shutdown.

### **Drive Column Power**

There are two drive-column power-cable configurations for the library:

- Single power cable
- Two power cables

## **Drive Column—Single Power Cable**

If the library's drive column has only one power cable, then all of the tape drives will be on a single circuit. If you install an optional power system in this type of library configuration, the optional PDU will supply redundant power to the library robotics *only*.

#### Drive Column—Two Power Cables

Newer machines incorporate *two* power cables into the drive column. This enables more power configurations for the customer.

You can configure these newer models so that half of the drives are connected to one PDU, and the other half of the drives are connected to the other.

**Note:** When installing drives in a library that has two PDUs and a two-power-cable drive column, connect each PDU to a separate branch circuit.

#### **Drive Column Power Connections**

If the library has *one* power cable running from the drive column, the plug for the column is connected at the rear of the standard PDU.

If there are *two* power cables running from the drive column, the plug labeled *PWR1* denotes the lower half of the drive column; *PWR2* denotes the upper half of the column. You may cross-couple the power plugs at the rear of the PDUs.

**Note:** StorageTek advises you to label which drives are connected to each PDU.

All motors return tachometer pulses to the MPC card. The MPC card monitors the tachometer ranges (determined during the tape library initialization process) for proper positioning. If the processor detects that a motor is out of range, the MPC card generates a servo power interrupt (SPI), disconnecting drive current to that motor.

The SPI prevents a robotic servo runaway condition. As a built-in safety feature, an SPI is generated if the tape library front door is opened when the tape library is operating.

In the dual power supply configuration, you can replace the defective power components—DC power supply, the AC PDU, or both—while the other power supply and PDU are operating.

## Cooling


Two +43 VDC fans cool the DC power supplies. The fans are in a tray under the electronics module.

The fans are monitored by the MPC microprocessor. If a fan fails, a Hall-effect sensor detects the lack of motion in the fan blades, and an FSC is posted to the FSC log. The machine may be configured to simultaneously notify the service representative (through an email message) of the failure.

Cooling for the rack area is required if equipment is installed in this section of the library.

## **Optional Cooling Fans**

Optional cooling fans are available if the UPS or other equipment is installed in the rack space of the library. These fans install on the rear door of the library and are replaced as a single unit.




## Robot

Figure A-3 shows the robot for the L180 library. The robot is located behind the front door and consists of:

- Theta assembly for lateral movement
- Z assembly for vertical movement
- Hand-camera assembly to mount and dismount cartridges

Most of the robot components are mounted on the Z column. The robot moves cartridges from the storage cells by rotating the Z column, moving the hand up and down the Z column, and reaching into a storage cell to grip a cartridge.

## **Theta Assembly**

The theta assembly is composed of the +43 V theta motor, the PRY card, and the theta drive belt. The theta assembly, under microprocessor control by the MPC card, moves the hand laterally within the library. A closed-loop servo feedback configuration controls theta positioning.

During initialization, the MPC card applies voltage to the theta motor to obtain the motor's range of motion. The MPC card tracks the position of the motor by reading the lines etched on the motor tachometer disk into microprocessor memory.

The starting point for these counts begins at the first theta crash stop and ends at the second crash stop. All subsequent positioning of the motor is based on these reference points. The size of the library (model 180-80, model 180-140, or model 180-180) is determined at the end of initialization, based on the total number of line counts.

Accurate positioning of the theta motor is achieved by first applying +43 V power to the motor (coarse positioning). When the position of the destination cell is near, +43 V power is turned off and the ±15 V operational amplifiers on the MPC card are energized.

The MPC card locks the motor disk at the determined tachometer line by alternately energizing the two voltages until the line position is fixed (fine positioning). The final position is set when zero voltage is detected at the tachometer line. This zero potential is held by +15 V on one side of the tachometer line and -15 V on the other side of the line.

When the MPC card requires the motor to move to a new destination, the operational amplifiers are turned off, +43 V is gated to the motor, and the tachometer disk begins to turn until the new, coarse position is found. Fine positioning is then done by the  $\pm 15$  V operational amplifiers.

If the motor fails to lock into correct position, the MPC card posts an FSC to the operator panel and the FSC log of the library.

## **Z** Assembly


The Z assembly is composed of the +43 V Z motor, the PRX card, and the Z drive belt. The Z assembly, under MPC card microprocessor control, moves the hand vertically within the library. Like the theta, a closed-loop servo feedback configuration controls Z positioning.

The operation of the Z assembly is virtually the same as the theta operation described above. The only difference between the two operations is that the Z motor uses the PRX card to interface with the MPC card. The Z motor and the theta motor are identical.

## **Hand-Camera Assembly**

Figure A-4 shows the hand-camera assembly components.

**Note:** The MPL, MPP, and MPS cards are linked on the MPZ flexible cable assembly.

Under control of the MPC card, the hand-camera assembly removes cartridges from a cell, CAP, or drive (called a get operation), and places cartridges into a storage cell, the CAP, or a drive (called a put operation). Hand signals to and from the MPC card are routed through the flexible cable connectors (at P/J 801 and 802) on the Z column.

When robotic initialization begins, the first command from the MPC card is to retract the reach mechanism. The retract command precedes any motion by the theta assembly or Z assembly. This ensures that the reach mechanism is not extended before robotic motion begins, thereby preventing damage to cartridges or to the reach mechanism.

The vision system, composed of the MPL illumination card and camera, is initialized at the calibration label at the bottom of the drive column, Panel 0. The camera reads the label image. The MPH card checks the readability of the bar code. The image and the bar code are then compared to the information that is stored in the MPC card memory.

After the vision system is verified, the hand extension and hand-to-camera calibrations are done. The hand is extended below the calibration block, and the gripper and hand extension are validated.

If any hand failure occurs, the MPC card posts an FSC to the operator panel and the FSC log of the library.

## Initial Program Load Sequence

An initial program load (IPL) occurs when the library powers on or the RESET button is pushed. The following headings describe this sequence:

## **Functional Microcode Loading**

After the processor and associated hardware are determined to be operational, the functional microcode becomes active in processor memory. Control is turned over to the embedded microcode, and the initialization process begins for the robotic mechanisms.

### **Initialization Process**

The MPC card directs the initialization process, which consists of:

- Robotic mechanism initialization and calibration
- Vision calibration
- Hand-camera assembly testing
- Audit of cartridges within the library
- Drive targeting and check for "in flux" condition on DLT drives
- Audit of reserve cells
- Load handle cycling for DLT drives

#### **Mechanism Initialization and Calibration**

Robotic mechanism parameters are loaded into processor memory, and calibration routines are executed. Monitored in this sequence are:

- Reach safe position: The reach mechanism fully retracts and the reach safe sensor *must* be detected before any theta or Z motion is initiated. This prevents possible damage to the hand-camera assembly or a cartridge.
- Z motor calibration: The Z assembly moves from end-stop to end-stop. The
  distance and time for this motion is compared against the assembly
  parameters within the microcode.
- Theta motor calibration: The theta assembly moves from theta stop to theta stop. The distance and time for this motion is compared against the assembly parameters within the microcode.

Besides the front theta stop, a second theta stop exists for the 84-cartridge, 140-cartridge, or 174-cartridge configuration.

#### Vision Calibration

After the robotic motors are calibrated, the robot moves to the vision calibration decal (below the drives at Column 0, Panel 0). Thresholds for the line scan camera are:

- Target—readability and accuracy of the image for locating array positions
- Bar code—readability and accuracy of bar code information

**Note:** The camera is operational:

- During initialization
- During audit
- When cartridges are entered into a CAP

During normal operation, the camera is turned off and cartridges are located by referencing the volume serial number (VOLSER) and cell location within the MPC card memory.

### **Hand-Camera Assembly Testing**

The hand-camera assembly is calibrated and tested near the vision calibration decal. The proximity sensor is aimed at the decal to see if the sensor indicator turns on. The assembly is then moved away from the decal to see if the indicator turns off. The gripper mechanism is extended to test for proper operation.

## **Audit of Library**

The next step for initialization is the audit of the library.

When the theta assembly, Z assembly, and hand-camera assembly complete their initialization and calibration routines, the MPC card begins an audit of the library cells. The theta assembly and Z assembly position the hand at the arrays in a column, the camera reads the VOLSERs of the cartridges, and the VOLSERs and array positions of the tapes are transferred into MPC memory.

#### CAUTION:

Client software determines how unlabeled, unreadable cartridges or cartridges placed upside down in the CAP are handled.

Entering unlabeled and unreadable cartridges into the library should be discouraged, because problems will arise every time the library audits the cartridges.

Entering a cartridge upside down could result in damage to the handcamera assembly and drive. During the audit process:

- Cartridges within drives are not audited.
- The client software determines how unlabeled, unreadable cartridges are handled.
- Whenever an audit is performed, the customer must request a client software update of the audit results. This must be done to maintain identical audit information between the library and client.
- Cartridge VOLSERs are read by the camera *only* during an audit or a CAP entry. When the audit or CAP entry is completed, cartridge movement is done strictly by reference to MPC memory.

An audit begins when:

- You power on the library
- You open and close the front door
- A system request to audit is entered at the client console

## **Drive Targeting**

In the next step of the initialization process, the robot moves to each drive and calculates the position of the drive's target. This ensures accurate and quick loading of cartridges during machine operation. For DLT drives, the load handles are checked for in flux conditions. Any handles found to be in flux will be lowered by the MPC card.

#### **Audit of Reserved Cells**

After drive targeting, the robot audits the six cells of the reserved area, below the cartridge access port (CAP). This area is explained below. If the library contains no DLT drives, this is the final initialization step.

## **Load Handling Cycling**

If DLT drives are present, and the load handles need to be cycled, all handles are raised to the loading position. This is the final initialization step.



## External Interfaces

The library supports these standard interfaces:

- A multi-initiator small computer system interface (SCSI) connection
- A Fibre Channel connection (requires feature code IF01)

In addition, the SCSI connection can be converted to Fibre Channel through a converter network.

Thus users can interface with the library through:

- A direct connection to a SCSI client (LVD or HVD)
- An indirect connection to a SCSI client (LVD or HVD)
- A Fibre Channel connection to a Fibre Channel arbitrated loop
- A 10baseT Ethernet connection that they access through a Web browser with the Horizon L Series Library Monitor (optional)

## **SCSI to Client Connections**

Two scenarios are possible for SCSI connections between a library and client.

#### **SCSI Client Direct Connections**

For client-to-library (direct) SCSI connections, a server connects to the drives and library through a multi-initiator SCSI bus. The library may have a control path that is separate from the data path to/from the drives (the drives are then off bus), or the control path may be daisy-chained to the data path (the drives are then on bus). The connection from the server to the library and/or drives is a SCSI Type-3, 68-pin cable.

#### **SCSI Client Indirect Connections**

An indirect connection to the library occurs when the library connects to a client through a network.

An example of an indirect connection would be:

- A library connected to a UNIX server
- The server connected to an Ethernet LAN network
- A cable connected between the Ethernet LAN and the client

A SCSI Type-3 68-pin cable connects the server to the library. The server may have its own control-side path or may be daisy-chained to a shared data bus with one or more drives.

**Note:** If the customer is using Automated Cartridge System Library Software (ACSLS), its level must be Version 5.3.2 or higher.

### **SCSI HVD or LVD Considerations**

With the advent of Ultrium tape drives, customers now have choices as to the type of SCSI interface on which they wish to operate: High Voltage Differential (HVD) or Low Voltage Differential (LVD). As shown in Table A-8, the HVD interface allows longer cable lengths, but throughput is lower than LVD; the LVD interface restricts cable lengths but provides faster throughput.

As a service representative you must ensure that you understand these cabling requirements as well as:

- How LVD Ultrium drives are different internally from HVD Ultrium drives
- How the library (that is, the control path) is converted to LVD operation
- What the Host Bus Adapter (HBA) requirements are
- What the consequences for mixing SCSI types on a bus are

#### **SCSI Cables**

The library and drives support *only* SCSI Type-3 connectors. If you use SCSI Type 1 or 2 cable connectors, you must order a SCSI-1- or SCSI-2-to-SCSI-3 adapter so that components can connect properly.

**Note:** If you are connecting the library or drives to an LVD SCSI bus, the cable can be no longer than 12 m (39.4 ft).

Table A-8 lists additional restrictions for SCSI connections that you should keep in mind.

#### LVD Ultrium Drives

The native operation for both the IBM Ultrium drives and the HP Ultrium drive is the LVD interface. For either drive to operate as HVD, the plant must install converter cards (Rancho and Paralan respectively) on their drive trays. There is no converter card for HVD operation on Seagate Ultrium drives; their model number dictates the type of operation.

When installing an Ultrium drive in the library, you must match the cable types and terminators with the bus type.

### **Library LVD Operation**

StorageTek allows the library to be converted to LVD operation through an extra interface card—the MPW card—that attaches to the MPC card. The MPW card fits into Slot 0 on the electronics module bulkhead. The customer orders the MPW card and card cage with library feature code LV02.

#### **SCSI Bus Precautions**

Use caution when connecting the LVD or HVD interfaces. Table A-9 lists potential equipment damage or bus-disabling situations that may arise if the two types are intermixed.

#### **CAUTION:**

Potential equipment damage: The single-ended, LVD, and HVD SCSI alternatives are not compatible and cannot be mixed on the same SCSI bus.

#### **Fibre Channel**

The library supports the following topologies with a single N\_Port attachment:

- Arbitrated loop—private loop
- Arbitrated loop—public loop

The arbitrated loop provides:

- Multiple connections for devices that share a single loop
- Point-to-point connections during communications

In a Fibre Channel arbitrated loop, as with SCSI, devices must arbitrate and win the connection before communications can begin. After a device is powered on and initialized on the loop, it must arbitrate and win to be able to communicate with other devices on the loop.

## **Private Arbitrated Loop**

If the arbitrated loop is not attached to a Fibre Channel fabric, it is a private loop. A private arbitrated loop can connect up to 126 N-type ports, and:

- Only point-to-point communication is possible between one initiator and one target at any time. (Other links on the loop act as repeaters.)
- Both initiator and target must reside within the same loop.

While the library supports this Fibre Channel topology, StorageTek does not recommend it. Its best implementation includes a Fibre Channel hub.

## **Public Arbitrated Loop**

If the Fibre Channel arbitrated loop contains at least one F-type (F=Fabric) port and is attached to a Fibre Channel fabric, it is a public loop. A public loop can contain up to 126 N-type ports and one F-type port. If the fabric connects to another arbitrated loop, then an initiator on one public loop might be able to communicate with a target on another.

#### **Fibre Channel Cable Considerations**

Table A-10 lists the cable and connector specifications for the library:

## **HBA Requirements**

#### **CAUTION:**

Mismatching SCSI operation types: The host bus adapters (HBAs) in the customer's server must match the library's SCSI bus type. If the interface to the library is HVD, then the customer's server must contain an HVD-compatible HBA. Likewise, if the interface to the library is LVD, then the server must contain an LVD-compatible HBA.

The server that the SCSI bus attaches to must have a compatible HBA. If the interface to the library is HVD, the customer's server must contain an HVD-compatible HBA. Likewise, if the interface to the library is LVD, then the server must contain an LVD-compatible HBA.

The following table compares device requirements—library, drives, and server—for LVD and HVD operation:

## **L-Series Library Admin**

The L-Series Library Admin is an optional web-based interface to the library. This interface lets a library's users configure, operate, and monitor the library through a workstation or PC that is running a Netscape or Microsoft browser. This interface must first be enabled and configured on the library. Installation and configuration instructions appear in the documentation that ships with the software components.

## Internal Interfaces

The MPC card monitors all interfaces to the library. These interfaces are:

- Client to CAP
- Library-to-HVD or Single-ended SCSI client
- Library-to-LVD SCSI client
- Library-to-drives
- Library-to-Fibre Channel
- Library-to-Personality Module and Horizon L Series Library Monitor
- Library-to-operator panel
- Library-to-SER1 port
- Library-to-CSE port

### Client-to-CAP

Cartridges are imported into and exported from the cartridge access port (CAP). Each CAP has two magazines. The top magazine is numbered one, the bottom magazine is numbered two. Each cell location in a CAP is assigned an element number.

There is no restriction on how cartridges are placed into a magazine or CAP. When the CAP door is closed, the robot will audit all CAP cell locations for cartridges.

When exporting cartridges, however, the robot will place the target cartridge into the lowest available element number first.

## Library-to-HVD or Single-Ended SCSI Client

The MPC card is jumpered at the factory for SCSI differential operations at J16. If SCSI single-ended operation is desired, the jumper is moved, and the SCSI cable from the MPC card to the bulkhead is repositioned at the MPC card single-ended connector.

Both SCSI operations require 68-pin connectors. Terminating power is supplied at J18. This is set at the factory to supply terminating power at the library end of the bus, but may be moved for customers who do not want terminating power at that library end of the bus.

The jumpers for operation type and terminating power are shown in Figure A-6 on page A-24.

The MPC card has two client serial ports (J32 and J33). Both the CSE port and the SER1 port are supported as a command line interface port.

## **Library-to-LVD SCSI Client**

Library LVD SCSI operation is directed through the MPW card, which is connected to the MPV card. The MPW card slides into the lower slot of the compact peripheral component interconnect (CPCI) assembly, which contains the MPV card. The MPV card, which operates as the CPCI backplane for the LVD SCSI interface, attaches to the MPC at J211.

## Library-to-Drives

The connection between the library MPC card and drives is a four-pin, RS422 interface. The connector for the drives is contained within the quick-disconnect connector for the drive tray. The cable for these lines runs from the drive connector to the MPC card at P/J24.

## **Library-to-Fibre Channel**

Library Fibre Channel operation is directed through the MPU card, which is connected to the MPV card. The MPU card slides into the lower slot of the compact peripheral component interconnect (CPCI) assembly, which contains the MPV card. This lower slot is designated Port 0 by the microcode and is the default location that currently must be used.

The MPV card, which operates as the CPCI backplane for the Fibre Channel interface, attaches to the MPC at J211. The client path for fiber operation is: Client > Fibre Channel Component > MPU > MPV > MPC.

**Note:** The MPU card is attached to the MPV card. The MPU card contains a Class 1 laser product that complies with sections 21CFR 1040.10 and 1040.11 of the Food and Drug Administration (FDA) regulations. Class 1 laser products do not require any special safety precautions.

## **L-Series Library Admin**

The MPK card, above right of the MPC card, contains an EEPROM that:

- Identifies the machine for a specific vendor (if required). When installed, the operator panel will display that vendor's name.
- Enables the L-Series Library Admin

If the MPK card is present and the MPC card must be replaced, you must reconnect the MPK card to the new MPC card. The vendor information and the Horizon L Series Library Monitor will remain effective. *However*, the customer's password and IP address *must* be re-entered during configuration.

## **Library-to-Operator Panel**

The operator panel communicates tape library status, configuration, diagnostic sequences, and FSC information. The operator panel provides buttons for running diagnostics and examining the 20 most recent tape library FSCs.

## **Library-to-SER1 Port**

The SER1 port provides a command line interface to the MPC card, allowing you to clear (purge) the FSC log and run diagnostic tests through a laptop. This interface is through an RJ45 connection.

**Note:** The baud rate for the SER1 port is 38,400.

#### **CAUTION:**

System Interruption: Be sure that the library and drives are offline before using this interface. It is a direct, command line interface and will take the library offline without posting a warning message.

## **Library-to-CSE Port**

The CSE port also provides a command line interface to the MPC card, allowing you to clear (purge) the FSC log and run diagnostic tests through a laptop. In addition, you may use this interface to download microcode to the library. This interface is through an RJ45 connection.

**Note:** The baud rate for the CSE port is 38,400.

#### **CAUTION:**

System Interruption: Be sure that the library and drives are offline before using this interface. It is a direct, command line interface and will take the library offline without posting a warning message.

## Other Interfaces

The library features three additional interfaces:

- An operator panel that communicates library status, configuration, diagnostic sequences, and fault symptom code (FSC) information. The operator panel provides menus for running diagnostic tests and for examining the 20 most recent library FSCs. The FSC information will help you troubleshoot should a component fail.
- A SER1 port that communicates the same operator panel information (in the previous paragraph) to a remote laptop device or through a serial modem connection. This interface is through an RJ45 connection. You may run diagnostic tests on the library through this port; however, please note that the library will go offline (that is, stop communicating with the client) without warning once the tests begin. This connection operates at 38400 bps.
- A CSE port that includes the same functionality as the SER1 port but also lets you download microcode to the library. This connection currently operates at 38,400 bps while running Flash 97.exe.

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
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
